Previous Data Review, March 2017

- Note: because the rubric was revised, data prior to 2019-20 was evaluated on a different scale. (Previous scale: 3=exemplary, 2=good, 1=barely adequate, o=inadequate; current scale: 4=excellent, 3=good, 2=sufficient, 1=poor, o=inadequate)
- Previous review in March 2017 noted that Sacred Scripture had a higher mean (2.15/3) than dogma (1.88/3) and moral (1.77/3), as well as a higher percentage of students scoring exemplary (30.8% versus 19.2% for both dogmatic and moral theology.)
- In previous long-range data, 3.7% (3 of 82 students) scored inadequate in Sacred Scripture, 4.9% (4 of 82 students) in dogmatic theology, and 7.3% (6 of 82 students) in moral theology.

Actions Taken After Previous Review

- Post exam STB survey conducted in April 2019 & April 2020 for student feedback on exam process
- STB Exam rubric updated after feedback from faculty examiners
- Made improvements to STB seminar based on instructor and student feedback




